Oconto Church Youth, Adults Return From Nashville Mission

The First American Lutheran Church of Oconto Youth Organization recently completed a week-long mission trip to Nashville, Tenn. Fifteen area youth and four adults participated in the trip, which began on Friday, July 16. Youth participating were: Abbie Beckman, Lauren Caldie, Lindsey Carey, Nathan Cox, Miles Exworthy, Natalie Flint, Maggie Henning, Travis Melland, Casey Peterson, Camille Sowle, Laine Stary, Halie Viestenz, Morgan Welch, Justine Woodworth and Sarah Woodworth.

The adult chaperones were Brad and Jane Weber, Mandy Caldie and Frank Votava. Including this year's participants, a total of 78 youth and adults have participated in the mission program through First American Lutheran Church. On the trip to Nashville the group worked at the Nashville Rescue Mission, Carl Resener Center, the Family Life Women's Center and the Second Harvest Food Bank of mid Tennessee.

The Nashville Rescue Mission is a nationally recognized Christian shelter and recovery program that serves Nashville and the surrounding area of Tennessee. Since its founding in 1954, the mission has provided not

only meals and beds, but also support and long-term treatment for men and women with addictions and other debilitating problems.

The Rescue Mission operates two campuses, the Carl Resener Men's Shelter and the Family Life Women's Center. The Carl Resener Center provides many programs such as a transitional living program for males over the age of 18, meals three times a day for anyone who is in need, showers, clothing. The center operates as a shelter for up to 1,000 males per night.

On any given day the Nashville Rescue Mission serves approximately 400 meals for breakfast, 500 meals for lunch, and 600 meals for supper. Last year the Mission was able to serve approximately 700,000 meals with a goal of 900,000 meals for 2010. All of the food prepared at the Mission is donated thru programs of the Second Harvest Food Bank.

Last year the Mission provided homeless men and women with more than 700,000 meals, 232,000 nights of shelter and 70,000 articles of clothing, as well as showers, haircuts, 760 professional doctor's appointments and 100 eye examinations.

Once they arrived in

Nashville the group was divided into 4 work teams that operated at 3 different work sites. Each day the teams rotated work at the Carl Resener Shelter with one of the teams daily working in the kitchen starting at 4:30 a.m. They assisted in breakfast preparation, breakfast serving, lunch preparation and lunch serving.

The youth also worked at the Rescue Mission warehouse organizing the many donations that arrive daily. In addition to the work at the mission, one crew assisted at the Second Harvest Food Bank of mid Tennessee. Work at this site consisted of sorting, organizing and packing some of the 39 million meals that are processed at the center annually. The FALC mission crew also packaged approximately 10,000 pounds of supplies for hurricane relief efforts. Four of the female participants worked at the Family Life Women's Shelter serving food, preparing beds, and landscaping.

During the stay in Nashville the FALC Youth Group helped in the preparation and serving of approximately 8,000 meals. While working at the Carl Resener Center the FALC Youth Group served a record number of meals for supper for the summer of 2010 with over 700 meals being prepared and served in one sitting.

Besides their work at the Nashville Rescue Mission the youth were able to fit in sightseeing to Memphis, St. Louis, Indianapolis, Mammoth Cave and Nashville.

This year's trip was the

ninth trip for the First American Youth-mission program. Previous trips were to McGraws, W. Va., Custer, S.D., St. Louis, Mo., Lynn, Mass., Coahoma, Miss., Monessen, Pa., Lame Deer, Mont. and New York City.

A special presentation about the Nashville mission trip will be given at First American Lutheran Church on Wednesday, Sept. 22 at 7 p.m. and Sunday, Sept. 26 at 9 a.m. during the regular church services. All community members are welcome to attend.

A planning meeting for next year's 2011 mission trip will be held on Sunday, Sept. 12 at 11 a.m. in the Youth Room at the Church.
